Blessing of the Palms

We praise you, O God, for your redemption of the world through Jesus Christ. Today Jesus entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph

and was proclaimed Messiah and King

by those who spread garments and branches along his way.

Bless these branches;

may they be signs of Jesus' victory over the brokenness of our world. May we who carry them follow Jesus in the way of his cross,

that, dying and rising with him, we may enter into your kingdom.

We ask this in Jesus name. Amen.

He came riding on a donkey, he came riding into town; slow and easy kind of lowlyl he came riding with the dawn. His disciples walked beside him, staying close, a little shy; not to sure where he would guide them, on to live or on to die. But all the morning sang his praises; waking birds and dancing wind; here he is, the Son of David; riding on to take his throne.

Then the children gathered, singing shouts of laughter, bursting cheer; in the streets their song was ringing, "hosannas" filled the morning air. Timid adults strained to see him, caught the Sprit, joined the song; spread their cloaks along before him, branches flashing in the sun. So all the city sang his praises; waking streets and dancing crowd; here he is, the Son of David; our Messiah, Son of God.

In our fasting, and our feasting, called to follow in his way; called to walk his road to Easter, called to live his cross today. Hosanna to the Son of David, hosanna to the heavens above; blessed is he who comes to save us, blessed is he who brings his love. Let us join to sing his praises; open hearts and souls to God; he is with us, Son of David; God's Messiah, Christ the Lord.

Call to Worship

We raise our voices and wave with joyful hope the palms of deliverance of God's people. *Hosanna! Hosanna to the Son of David!* Our hearts are filled with expectation as we welcome the coming king. *Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!* We receive into the crowded streets of our lives the one who is Savior, not only of us, but of all the earth. **Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest heaven!**

Prayer of the Day

Lord, your love is broken open among cheering crowds and traitor's coins, deserting friends and hands washed clean, the mockery of power and the baying mob. As we follow your way of passion, give us faith to bring our weak and divided hearts to the foot of the cross and the door of the guarded tomb that they might be opened, astonished and healed; through Jesus Christ, who carries the weight of the world. Amen.

The Holy Gospel according to Matthew (21:1-11)

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, ²saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. ³If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." ⁴This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, ⁵"Tell the

daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them.

[°]A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. [°]The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" 10

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" ¹¹The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

A Brief Reflection: By Rev. Lionel

(The written reflection below is offered for those with no internet access, to read at home.)

Today, as we celebrate Palm Sunday, I'm struck by Jesus' words in today's Gospel: "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately."

Despite the growing religious and political opposition to his ministry, Jesus made the firm decision to keep "living out loud" which meant carrying on with his ministry as usual. So Jesus makes the risky decision to travel to Jerusalem with his disciples so they could celebrate the Passover festival there together – in the religious centre of the Jewish world.

But Jerusalem was also the epicentre of the political and religious opposition to Jesus' ministry, and Jesus was considered a politically and spiritually subversive leader to the Jewish and Roman authorities. So Jesus' decision was putting his physical safety at risk. But that doesn't stop him. His ministry remains his focus.

What's your experience of situations when you need to reach out to others to ask for help? Jesus seems to have no problem sending the disciples off ahead of him to the next village to help prepare for the next leg of his journey into Jerusalem. Jesus' tone seems pretty casual as he tells the disciples to simply say: "The Lord needs them" if anyone asks why they are heading off with two donkeys from the village. What nerve!

Jesus' boldness leaves me wondering: Does Jesus' "asking" end there? What else is God asking of us so that we can courageously "live out loud" the same way that Jesus did? What is God asking of us, so that we can keep walking forward – like Jesus – and bearing witness to God's unconditional love during this time when so much fear and uncertainty abound? The cheering crowds laid down their cloaks on the ground. What offerings, what gifts and abilities are we being called to 'lay down' before Jesus for the cause of God's reign of love and compassion? What gifts can we 'release' out into our world, so that others can experience God's healing presence in this challenging time? May we keep "living out loud" and walking forward with love and compassion - with Jesus!

Holy, Holy, Lord, God of heavenly hosts Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna, hosanna, hosanna in the highest, Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

On the night that Jesus was betrayed, he took bread, gave thanks and blessed it, and broke it and gave it to his disciples saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, Jesus took the cup, blessed it and gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink saying: This cup is the cup of the new covenant relationship with God, poured out for all people for the forgiveness of sins and for abundant life. Do this in remembrance of me.

Send now your life-giving Spirit upon us, and upon these gifts of bread and cup, so we may be the bread of compassion and the cup of hope for all who hunger and thirst for your presence.

Presider: The gifts of God for the people of God

All: Thanks be to God!

We share the bread with words such as: "The body of Christ, broken for you". We share the cup with words such as: "The blood of Christ, poured out for you".

Take a moment to commune yourself with the bread and cup.A time of Silent prayer follows communion

Prayer after communion We give you thanks, tender God, that you have refreshed us through the healing power of this gift of life. Strengthen us through this gift in faith toward you and fervent love toward one another; through Christ, our healing companion. Amen.
